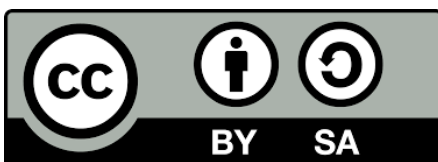


# Netiquette

## Scenario 2

### Answer sheet

1. There are multiple spelling mistakes and no capitalization. Correct spelling and syntax make the sender appear more reliable and trustworthy.
2. This person sent multiple messages, when they could have sent one. One of the rules of netiquette is to respect people's bandwidth.
3. They use very informal language, "I'm looking for a job".
4. They use the acronym hmu – Hit Me Up, which is an extremely informal way of saying "contact me," "text me," "phone me," or some other version of "reach me to follow up on this."<sup>1</sup>
5. Not providing any relevant information about themselves. Given the context, some information on their contact details and availability for future discussion should have been provided.
6. They chose a very informal way to contact the company. A chat is not ideal for a job application, unless the potential employer explicitly asks to be contacted through chat.
